1. ARP ESSER Assurances

The American Recovery Plan - Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund(ARP ESSER) is intended to address the impact that Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools. ESSER funds will be used for additional cleaning personnel to maintain the cleaning protocols as established by the Governor, CDC, and Ohio Department of health to ensure the health and well-being of students and staff. This involves additional cleaning materials and equipment to ensure sanitized and safe surfaces. Additional cleaning personnel would be needed to ensure the deep cleaning is completed throughout the day and the frequency of cleaning is maintained. With the possibility of student families electing virtual learning, there is a possibility that all current teaching staff would not be necessary as it relates to servicing students who are in attendance (physically). The "extra" personnel members could be RIF, instead, the district would maintain them to provide for the instructional support services. Thus, all personnel retain their current positions and assist students in whatever form education exists in the future.

the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year?

Rittman Schools have identified academic and educational needs of students as a result of lost learning time. Rittman Schools will offer a summer program for academics and activities through the YMCA to ensure children receive additional educational opportunities during the summer. The schools will be offering a credit recovery summer program for middle school and high school students during the summer months. Rittman Elementary School will offer a 3-week summer school program for students who were remote, need additional intervention, and who need a jump start, academically, for the new school year. Over the course of next school year, comprehensive after-school programs will be offered and bussing will be provided for students who need additional instruction, intervention and enrichment.

ESSER funds will be used for additional cleaning personnel to maintain the cleaning protocols as established by the Governor, CDC, and Ohio Department of health to ensure the health and well-being of students and staff. This involves additional cleaning materials and equipment to ensure sanitized and safe surfaces. Additional cleaning personnel would be needed to ensure the deep cleaning is completed throughout the day and the frequency of cleaning is maintained. The "extra" personnel members will be maintained to provide for the virtual learning component and intervention support of our in person environment. Thus, all needed personnel will be retained in their current positions or a new position if needed.

Rittman Schools will continue to employ our wellness coordinator, district nurses, and social worker. The district will also begin a partnership with Ohuddle (mentoring services), in order to ensure that students have positive role models and have individual to speak with to help their current situation, or employ the correct individuals to assist. The Village Network and The Counseling Center to provide social and emotional support along with our student resource officer. A team approach is used to identify needs and implement a timely plan of action.

5. Briefly describe how the LEA determined its most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19.

From surveys administered over the past two school years, parents indicated that they are concerned about the safety of the schools due to the virus, as it relates to student proximity cleaning/disinfecting areas, the need to establish a more unified virtual learning platform to ease parent confusion as it relates to helping their own children learn at home, and continued concern about student emotional well being. The teachers indicated that they needed additional support from parents and accountability for students, additional sanitation help for student facilities and materials, instructional materials to help with achievement gaps, additional time for students in intervention, as well as accountability platforms for virtual learning. As a district these needs have taken priority as we move forward. Meeting student basic needs and concerns about sanitation of school spaces and materials will meet a primary need. Then, we are focusing on the platform and means of student delivery of instruction to ensure social distancing, uniform virtual learning platform, and resources that can assist parents for ease of use at home and accountability tracking for teachers at school. We will also focus on student social-emotional learning to help the stresses and anxieties that the pandemic has created in children and families. Professional development in trauma and behaviors, as well as in intervention and instructional foci will take priority.

6. Briefly describe the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff with these funds.

Rittman Schools will continue to provide licenses for the universal screening tools and online instructional component of iREADY over the summer months and into next school year. Parents and students can continue using these tools over the summer months. Students will also be afforded intervention services to assist with learning gaps throughout the course of next school year during the school day, after school programming, special programming during the summer, and additional intervention services for students. After initial benchmark testing in the fall, gaps would be identified and students would begin to receive intervention services. Students would also receive intervention services over the summer months. Funds would be used for teachers who will deliver remote instruction next school, provide for additional intervention services in the core subjects over the summer and throughout next school year, additional materials that teachers will need to support student learning over the summer and into next school year. Funds will be used by the maintenance staff to ensure that we have adequate supplies and materials to ensure safe and sanitized schools. Over the course of the next school year, we will continue to maintain more frequent cleaning of surfaces and materials and the funds will be used for the additional personnel to ensure that we meet the guidelines as outlined by the state for effective cleaning materials, effective cleaning practices and proper timing of sanitation.

 We will continue to support remote learning for students that need isolation due to exposure or health related concerns. This entails ensuring adequate personnel, equipment and access points for connectivity.

This plan supports our students' academic and social emotional needs using our multi-tiered system of support and local partnerships.
